TOUR 1: Munich's medieval old town



From Munich's beginnings in 1158 under Duke Henry the Lion to the modern history of National Socialism, Munich's city center has a lot to offer.

Where is the grave of Napoleon's stepson? Why is there a cannonball in the wall of St.

Peter's Church? Where did Hitler found his party? And what is so special about the Viktualienmarkt?

TOUR 2:

The path of Hitler's Beer Hall Putsch



Hitler called Munich the capital of the movement. This is where he found his political friends and where he founded the NSDAP. On November 9, 1923, he made his first attempt to seize power in Germany by initiating the so-called Beer Hall Putsch. It was a failure. After the seizure of power, the Nazis celebrated the coup in Munich every year on November 9th. The tour starts in front of the Hilton Hotel Munich City where the Bügerbräukeller was once located. From here the tour heads towards the city center past the former Sterneckerbräu, where the first office of the NSDAP was located, via Marienplatz to Odeonsplatz, where the putsch was stopped. The tour ends at Königsplatz, which the Nazis used for their own purposes.

TOUR 3: Maxvorstadt – The vision of King Ludwig I heart and brain of Munich



Maxvorstadt is Munich's cultural and intellectual heart, blending history, art, and academia in a compact and vibrant district. Home to Ludwig Maximilian University (LMU), it also holds the Weiße Rose Memorial, honoring the student resistance against the Nazi regime. The stunning Ludwigskirche features one of the largest altar frescoes in the world, while iconic spots like Alter Simpl, the birthplace of Dadaism, and the historic Schelling Salon, frequented by figures like Lenin and Hitler, highlight its cultural legacy. The Kunstareal, with world-class museums and galleries, showcases the district's deep artistic roots, and Königsplatz, with its grand neoclassical architecture, stands as a testament to both cultural splendor and historical complexity. Maxvorstadt is a district where Munich's vibrant past and present converge, offering a rich tapestry of stories and sights to discover.

TOUR 4: Olympic site from 1972

TOUR 5:

<u>Au-Haidhausen - From shanty town to Munich's</u> <u>most popular neighborhood.</u>

Tucked between the Isar River and the modern city center, the area blends stately 19th-century boulevards with narrow lanes that feel almost village-like. Here, elegant fountains and leafy squares coexist with traces of political upheaval, artistic innovation, and everyday Munich life. It's a neighborhood shaped by both tradition and transformation—ideal for anyone curious to explore Munich beyond its postcard-perfect image.
